2020 ANNUAL REPORT TO THE CITIZENS OF CLAY COUNTY

In a year that presented many challenges for everyone due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our 2020 report highlights the innovative ways our partner agencies pivoted to serve older adults. There was a spirit of resiliency and many successes as our partner agencies adapted to meet the needs of Clay County older adults in a safe and effective manner.

As 2020 progressed and services were limited due to the pandemic, a surplus of funds was projected. Our board made the decision to provide an opportunity for our partners to apply for special community support funds to specifically address social isolation, nutritional programs, technology, and transportation. We also assured our grantees that we would be flexible and supportive to continue grant payments even though programs were modified significantly.

On behalf of Clay County Senior Services' board and staff, we would like to thank our grantees and contractors for the creative and safe ways they have continued to serve Clay County seniors. As a result of teamwork and our shared successes during this unusual year, we are positioned to be even stronger going forward.

Missouri Association of Levy Boards & Senior Organizations (MoALSO)

Clay County is one of 55 Missouri counties that have dedicated funding from a property tax levy fund that enable us to support all of our partners and contractors to deliver services to Clay County older adults. 
Kansas City Communities for All Ages Incentive Grants with Municipalities

Through CCSS' incentive match funds, the following cities have achieved recognition as Kansas City Communities for All Ages: Gladstone, Kearney, and North Kansas City - Gold Level; Excelsior Springs and Liberty - Silver Level. With leadership from the Mid-America Regional Council, these aging-friendly cities are planning for changing demographics and adoption of policy and program approaches that make Clay County a great place to live for all ages.



Northland Living Well Collaborative

CCSS is providing the administrative leadership to coordinate, promote, and support inter-agency delivery of health education classes. Ten organizations are members of the collaborative that focuses on providing easy access to classes for people living with chronic health conditions. Fourteen adults completed Living Well with Chronic Conditions self-management programs

clients received in-home services, including light housekeeping, personal care, and respite. 4 families received respite care through the Consumer Directed Respite Care program.



Senior Centers

The following centers received CCSS funding for daily operations or activities: Excelsior Springs, Liberty, Kearney, and Smithville. In 2020, each center modified their program to meet the nutritional and social needs of its participants. Each center adapted by providing drive through meal pick-up, check-in calls, and connection to technology and other resources.



Pivoting to online classes and support was a natural for the Firehouse as more seniors had a desire to learn and use technology during the pandemic. The program continued to provide social opportunities, expanded their volunteer ride service, and delivered fresh fruits and vegetables. The highlight was CCSS awarding \$20,000 in community support funds for a new van; the community rallied together and raised the required matching funds within days.


meals were delivered by Northland Shepherd's Center, an average of 154 meals delivered daily. Kearney Senior Center delivered 5,111 meals, an average of 19 meals delivered daily.



Aging Mastery Program (AMP)

Thirty-six adults ranging in age from 54 to 88 participated in the 10-week core AMP; eight caregivers attended the 12-week AMP for Caregivers.

The 10-week core program and 12-week Caregiver program from the National Council on Aging help older adults create their own personal



pathways for aging. When you participate in the Aging Mastery Program (AMP), you will learn the importance of small, consistent changes over time that lead to mastery of healthy habits.

Senior Falls Prevention Coalition of Clay and Platte Counties:

Twenty-six-member organizations participated in our monthly meetings featuring educational presentations, evidence-based falls prevention class opportunities, and planning outreach and awareness events such as Falls Prevention Awareness Week in September. As a part of Awareness Week, we shared Facebook videos highlighting our five pillars of falls prevention, engaging 832 seniors through social media. In all, more than 5,200 people participated in falls prevention activities that week.

In 2020, our Seniors Falls Prevention Coalition of Clay & Platte Counties was honored to receive the Northland Professionals In Aging Sandy Gardner Giving Back Award of \$3,000. These funds allowed us to further expand falls prevention initiatives among our senior



population, including awareness, education, and access to effective prevention programs and resources.

Clay County residents received discounted fitness classes and memberships offered through our exercise partners.

174

seniors utilized their educational scholarships from our partners. 80 avid learners leaped into virtual classes with KU/Osher Lifelong Learning.



Fire & EMS Partnership

Fifteen seniors were assisted with referrals for falls prevention interventions through our partners: Gladstone, Excelsior Springs, Kearney, North Kansas City, and Northland Regional Ambulance District.

Knox Box Contribution - We utilized paid membership fees to purchase and contribute two Knox Boxes for the Gladstone Fire/EMS Department. A Knox Box is a commercial lock box the fire department will install outside the home of a "frequent faller" so they can access the homeowner's key to enter the residence, without requiring them to break in to provide emergency assistance.

Northland Grandfamilies

To help families that are managing the care and responsibilities for dependent children, support services were provided by the University of Missouri Extension-Clay County. Case management, support groups, and resources were provided to thirty-five families.

Rural Senior Advocate Program

The Good Samaritan Center served 152 older adults with essential services including transportation, medical prescription delivery, paperwork and financial assistance to obtain benefits.

"The COVID pandemic has had a strong impact on seniors in our community. We have found that our efforts, though different than the format previously provided, have served to help seniors and caregivers experience a sense of being cared for and connected to others. We also have experienced an increased awareness of the importance of remaining agile and flexible as we continue to adapt to the needs of seniors in the midst of COVID-19 challenges. One silver lining that we have noted during the pandemic is a community-wide urgency of the emotional needs of seniors. Many of these needs were present even prior to COVID-19 but have been magnified during this time. It seems to have increased awareness and desire to offer increased services in order to meet the demand of these growing needs. I have been able to help seniors who have no one else to turn to and thanks

Tri-County Older Adult Mental Health Services

The Older Adult Program played an increasingly valuable role for seniors, caregivers, and professionals in the northland community during the pandemic. In response to the risk of increased isolation and its depressive symptoms, 489 participants were able to stay connected through virtual presentations, support groups, drive-through events, and porch deliveries during this challenging time.

Senior Tax Exchange Program (STEP)

The contributions of STEP participants have always been valued by the North Kansas City School District.

Due to the pandemic, STEP participants were unable to enter school buildings to serve in their scheduled assignments. Instead, STEP participants adapted to off-site opportunities to complete their service hours. As a result, they became better acquainted with the many organizations that support district students and felt part of a larger community network.



Participants logged 1,390 service hours this year by assisting with delivery of food to families through the Backsnack & Feed Northland Kids program, sorting clothing donations, and various other assignments to support schools.

Assistance League of Kansas City-Senior Outreach Service

The outreach program pivoted from direct outreach to providing blizzard bags that included shelf-stable food and essential supplies to 385 homebound older adults.



Northland Christmas Store

This program lifted the spirits of 215 older adults who received holiday boxes with food, essential supplies and gift cards.

Ambulatory older adults benefited this year from a new ride service called "Jet Express," launched in partnership with Jewish Family Services and Lyft.

Special Community Support Funds

Due to the pandemic and a pause in some services being utilized, CCSS' ended the year with a funding surplus. Our Board of Directors approved inviting our partners to submit funding requests for special projects or program expansion. The following agencies received community support funds:

GRANTS

With the growing demand for home delivered meals, CCSS was pleased to receive a \$6,000 grant from the Harvest Ball Society to support our five Meals on Wheels partner organizations: Excelsior Springs Parks and Recreation, Northland Shepherd's Center, the City of Smithville, the City of Liberty, and Kearney Home Delivered Meals. Funds were used for meal scholarships, gas cards for volunteers, protective equipment and supplies, and delivery carriers.


The Missouri Department of Transportation awarded us a Missouri Elderly and Handicapped Transportation Assistance Program grant in the amount of \$6,737.73 to offset costs of our transportation program. This extra funding prevented over expenditure in our transportation budget.

The Northland Community Services Coalition received a grant for \$3,500 from the Northland Professionals In Aging 2020 Sandy Gardner Giving Back Award. The funds will be used to reprint the Northland Human Services Directory.


